Directions:

- From Boston: Take South East Expressway/93 South. At Braintree split stay on 93 South (128 North) to Exit 5A*
- From Cape Cod: Take Route 3 North, to Route 93 South (128 North), to exit 5A*
- From Rhode Island: Take 95 North or Route 24 North, to 93 North (128 South), to Exit 5A*

*Take a right at the first set of lights on to Scanlon Drive. Lombardo's will be on the right, next to the Comfort Suites.

Helen Meltzer

Born in New York City, Helen (Fuchs) Meltzer moved to the Boston area as a child and subsequently attended Radcliffe College. After college, she began her career as Executive Director of Cambridge Community Services, where she served for 15 years. From 1964-1987, Helen was Executive Director of the Massachusetts Public Health Association, leading many campaigns for public health programs over the years. The Helen Meltzer Award is given by MPHA in her honor. She has served as President's Counselor of Brandeis University, Boston and Regional President of Brandeis University National Committee, board member of the Delta Dental Plan and first chair of the Delta Dental Foundation. Helen was on the Board of Certification of Health Officers for 5 years. She was a member of the Board of Health and the Advisory Council of Health of the City of Newton for over 40 years. Helen Meltzer was a founder of The Public Health Museum in 1990.

Carolyn "Hooky" Darack

Carolyn (Wallace) Darack is a native of Brookline and attended Simmons College and the Simmons School of Social Work. Hooky joined the Greater Boston Chapter of the Massachusetts Heart Association in 1954 as Director of Heart Information Services. In 1966, she became the Executive Director of the Massachusetts Health Council, and continued in that role for 22 years, receiving its annual award in 1985. Hooky helped found the Newton Senior Service Center, the Hospice of the Good Shepherd in Newton, and the Coalition Organized for Health Education in Schools (COHES). She received the Ira V. Hiscock Award and the President's Award of the New England Public Health Association. Hooky was an appointed member of the Advisory Council of Health of the City of Newton and the Board of the Newton Visiting Nurses Association. She currently serves as the Secretary of the Massachusetts Life Care Residents Association. Hooky Darack was a founder of The Public Health Museum in 1990.

Chester "Chet" Kennedy, Jr.

Middleboro native Chet Kennedy returned from World War II in the Pacific to the Massachusetts College of Art. He served the Massachusetts Department of Public Health in a number of health education roles from 1953 to 1984, including Director of Health Education. From 1984 to 1989, he was District Health Officer for Southeastern Massachusetts. Chet served in leadership positions in a number of civic, educational and public health organizations, including President of the New England Health Education Association, Co-Chair of the Coalition Organized for Health Education in Schools (COHES), Executive Secretary of the Massachusetts Health Officers Association, and President of the New England Public Health Association. He chaired and co-chaired sections of the Massachusetts Public Health Association and the Massachusetts Health Council. He was a member of the Sherborn Board of Health from 1974 to 1986. Chet Kennedy was a founder, first President and principal creator of exhibits at The Public Health Museum.
